Manitoba Northern Ontario

As of June 30, 2013,
65 species in Ontario will receive general habitat protection under the Endangered Species Act. These species previously only had species protection and a permit was typically not required through abiding by timing windows. Development within this protected habitat may now require a permit.





## Of these species:

- 17 are found in woodland habitats, similar to Little Brown Myotis (Bat)
- 1 is found in grassland habitats, similar to Bobolink
- 5 are found in wetland habitats, similar to Blanding's Turtle
- 17 are found in aquatic habitats, similar to Redside Dace
- 6 can be found in a variety of habitats, similar to Butternut and Eastern Foxsnake

These species occur geographically throughout Ontario. Of the 65 species:

- 31 are primarily found in Southwestern Ontario
- 18 are primarily found in Southern Ontario
- 3 are primarily found in Eastern
  Ontario
- 4 are primarily found in Northern Ontario

## **STEPS TO TAKE:**

- 1. Determine which species have potential to occur based on your location and current land use.
- 2. Undertake surveys to detect Species at Risk within appropriate habitat. These surveys often have timing restrictions.
- 3. Create a plan to manage Species at Risk on your projects. Actively managing your risk can save both time and money.
