

Housing Starts Show Signs of Improvements

A Return to Historic Averages

April 10, 2013 - Toronto, ON – Housing starts in Ontario are showing signs of improvement with several metropolitan areas recording higher numbers in March 2013 compared to the same time last year according to the latest housing starts released by the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC).

"March housing activity continues to demonstrate the buoyancy of the home building sector," said Joe Vaccaro, COO of Ontario Home Builders' Association. "While last year's multi-unit starts were trending unusually high, March 2013 shows a return to the historical average in Ontario. In this context we can see that while the single-detached sector remains relatively stable with the majority of metropolitan areas showing little change, the high-rise, multi-unit sector continues to normalize. CMHC has forecasted 65,000 housing starts for 2013, I expect as construction projects enter the building stage we'll see the numbers reflect the forecast."

Metropolitan areas that have showed an increase in housing starts include: Barrie, Guelph, Hamilton, Oshawa, Peterborough, St. Catharines-Niagara and Windsor.
